Southampton Haemophilia Centre

We have given you this factsheet because you have been referred to the Southampton Haemophilia Centre. What is the Southampton Haemophilia Centre?

At the Southampton Haemophilia Centre, we care for people with haemophilia and other inherited bleeding disorders, such as:

- Von Willebrand disease
- platelet function disorders

The Southampton Haemophilia Centre is based on C level at Southampton General Hospital (SGH) and is open Monday to Friday, 8.30am to 4.30pm.

Our Southampton Haemophilia Centre team

Our team is made up of a number of healthcare professionals, including:

- haematology consultants
- haemostasis clinical nurse specialists
- a thrombotic thrombocytopenic purpura (TTP) nurse specialist
- a research team

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Emergency access

If you are registered at the Southampton Haemophilia Centre, you will have 24-hour emergency access to our services in case you have an injury or experience concerning bleeding, such as:

- a nosebleed that does not stop after 30 minutes
- bleeding into a joint or muscle
- · blood in your stool (poo) or urine

Head injuries

If you have had a head injury, go to the emergency department immediately. Contact the haemostasis clinical nurse specialists or the on-call haematology registrar using the details below. They will arrange for you to have urgent treatment in the emergency department.
